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(1) Methodology and tools
Interpretive methods → Discourse Analysis

Quantitative: Corpus Linguistics (LancsBox)

Qualitative: Critical Discourse Analysis (by hand)

How did Scottish political parties use the management of the covid-19 crisis to bolster their constitutional position?

(2) Actors and corpora

- 5 Scottish political parties: SNP, Tories, Labour, Greens, LibDem
- Covid-19 Committee in Holyrood 24/04/20 → 18/03/21 + Manifestos 2021
- Analysis:
 - (A) CL: abduction (collocates, keywords, statistics, comparison)
 - (B) CDA: use in context (meaning-making), discourse prosody, topoi

Constitutional « response »

Conservative Party

· Positive evaluation of the UK's actions / Negative evaluation of the SNP's actions

« The tremendous success of the UK vaccination programme » « The UK government's furlough and self-employment income support schemes (...) were a lifeline » « Under the SNP, Scotland has become the 'sick man of Europe' »

· Work with rather than against the UK / Indyref is a distraction from recovery

« We cannot deliver our recovery if our parliament and our country are paralyzed by the SNP's obsession with another divisive independence referendum »

Green Party

- · Positive evaluation of the Scottish Gov. / Negative evaluation of the Scottish Gov.
 - « The Scottish Government response to Covid has been hampered by poor planning »
- Devolution independence : not directly related to Covid

LibDem

- · Negative evaluation of the Scottish Government's actions
 - « The Scottish Government missed the opportunity last summer to prepare for the second wave. Testing was neglected and quarantine checks were slack »
- Work with the UK where relevant *but* reform towards a federal UK / Recovery > divisive and irresponsible referendum

« We won't risk destroying trade with the UK through an independence referendum » « No matter what your view on independence, the wake of a terrible pandemic is not the moment for that »

Labour Party

- · Positive evaluation of the Scottish Gov. / Negative evaluation of the Scottish Gov.
- « The approach taken by both the Scottish and UK Governments, while welcome, has focused on the immediate risks and stop-gap solutions » « We give credit to the Scottish Government for the way it has communicated and taken people with it » »
- Full use of devolved powers while working with the UK where necessary / Recovery > Indyref

« The last thing we need is more constitutional turmoil; our collective priority must be the national recovery »

SNP

- · Positive and negative evaluation of the UK and Scottish governments' actions
 - « The area on which we have expressed concerns has been the significant absence of COBRA discussions»
 - « To be blunt, the Scottish government does not have the borrowing powers and some of the tools that we need »
- Full powers of independence are needed to drive recovery
 - « We are seeking your permission at this election for an independence referendum to be held after Covid when the crisis has passed but in time for us to equip our Parliament with the full powers it needs to drive our long term recovery from Covid »

(B) Summary + statistics

- Except for the Greens, Covid has become another constitutional argument;
- Opposition to indyref > change in/retention of the current structure;
- · Criticism is rare in terms of volume;
- Use of keywords for constitutional change: not statistically significant.
