Biographies of speakers

Keynote panel



Professor Marius Gilbert is vice-rector of research and valorization, and vice-rector of culture and scientific mediation at the Université libre de Bruxelles. His research focuses on the epidemiology of avian influenza, emerging infectious diseases with pandemic potential, and global changes in livestock production systems. During the COVID pandemic, he was part of the expert group assembled by then Belgian prime minister Sophie Wilmes to advise the government and was at the forefront of communication with the media. He is also a columnist at the national journal Le Soir around the theme of science and society.



Ágnes Farkas – Team Leader – AI Language Services Advisory, Directorate-General for Translation, European Commission. Ágnes Farkas works as the head of DG Translation's AI Language Services Advisory, an advisory body with the mission to promote eTranslation and other AI-based multilingual services managed by DGT for EU institutions and eligible users across EU Member States. The advisory body also provides user support and expert guidance to clients. She previously worked as a policy officer in the field of multilingualism and as acting head of unit and translator in DGT's Hungarian translation department. She holds master's degrees in translation and interpretation, as well as in French language and political sciences.



Fanny Meunier is a full professor of English language, linguistics, and teacher education at UCLouvain, Belgium. She also serves as the Academic Director of the CU.mil (Multilingualism, Interculturality, and Language Lab) within the Circle U. European University Alliance. Her research spans fundamental, instructed, and applied aspects of additional language acquisition, and she is actively involved in pre- and in-service teacher education, where she fosters collaborative teacher-researcher initiatives. Her most recent projects focus on pluriliteracies, i.e. the development of advanced and critical literacy skills across multiple languages and contexts. She also focusses on how technology can empower learners and teachers in the human-machine era.



Damien Hansen is assistant professor of translation and AI at the ULB, and has obtained a PhD in translation studies from the University of Liège, as well as in computer science from the Grenoble Alpes University. His doctoral work, focused on the topic of literary machine translation, looked into the possibility of adapting MT systems to the style of individual literary translators, but also into the ergonomic and social issues related to the technicization of the field. Recently, his research shifted more towards the effects of translation tools on the cognitive processes and socio-economic factors involved in creative translation, but his interests also brought him to study the experimental "détournements" of technology and to the field of game studies, where he examines the interplay between languages and games.

Moderator of the keynote panel



María Isabel Soldevila Brea is a Dominican journalist and communication specialist, currently Head of Communication at the CIVIS European University Alliance, where she leads strategic efforts across a transnational university network. Her 25-year career bridges media, education, and European affairs, with a focus on democracy and human rights. A Fulbright grantee, she earned a Master's in Journalism from Columbia University and pursued further studies at NYU and the University of Paris Sorbonne. Soldevila held key editorial roles in major Dominican media and directed the School of Communication at PUCMM in Santo Domingo. A Knight-Wallace Fellow at the University of Michigan (2015), she continues to champion press freedom and civic engagement in global education.

Bogdan Oprea, PhD in Communication Sciences, with a thesis on manipulation on social media, Head of the Journalism Department of the Faculty of Journalism and Communication Sciences, University of Bucharest, Senior Lecturer and specialist in the study of disinformation and manipulation. He has 25 years of experience in journalism and communication in public administration. In recent years, among others, he has worked as a Spokesperson for the President of Romania and Head of the Public Communication Department within the Presidential Administration, Spokesperson for the Ministry of Regional Development and Tourism, Spokesperson for the Ministry of Health, and EU High-Level Adviser on Communication and Visibility of EU

Assistance and Reform Impact at the State Chancellery of the Government of the Republic of Moldova. Bogdan is the author of the "Online fake news and disinformation: recognize and verify. Handbook for all internet users" (2021, Polirom Publishing House, Iași; 2022, for 2nd edition) and the coordinator of the international interuniversity Blended Intensive Programme (BIP) type course "Online fake news and disinformation: recognize and verify", organized, within the CIVIS university alliance, by the University of Bucharest, together with Université libre de Bruxelles, and Universidad Autónoma de Madrid / "La Sapienza" Università di Roma. He has been invited to give more than 100 lectures, courses, workshops in the United States, Canada, New Zealand, France, Belgium, Germany, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Greece, Poland, Argentina, Uruguay, Senegal, Azerbaijan, Iraq, the Republic of Moldova and Romania. He is alumnus of scholarships of the United States Department of State, Ministère de l'Europe et des Affaires étrangères de France, and the European Commission, and his courses and teaching activity have been awarded several times by the Romanian Association of the Software and Services Industry - ANIS and by the Senate of the University of Bucharest. Dr Laurence Dierickx has a professional background in data and computer journalism. She holds a master's degree in information and communication science and technology and a PhD in Information and Communication Science. Her dissertation examined the implementation of news automation in newsrooms; through a socio-technical lens derived from science and technology studies. She is a postdoctoral researcher at the Department of Information

Science and Media Studies at the University of Bergen (Norway) since 2022, where she focuses on professional practices and processes in fact-checking from the perspective of developing responsible AI-based technology. She teaches data and digital investigative journalism at the Université Libre de Bruxelles (Belgium) and is a member of the ReSIC research centre. In 2024, she was accepted as a research fellow at the Digital Democracy Centre (x TrygFonden) at the University of Southern Denmark, where her research focused on the use of large language models in fact-checking. In 2025, she was appointed interim lecturer in AI at the Department of Information and Communication Science at ULB.



Jérémie Jenard is a Communication Officer at Université libre de Bruxelles (ULB), where he oversees strategic communication initiatives for the "education" mission of the university. He also teaches Applied Communication as an Assistant Lecturer, bridging theory and practice for master's students. With experience in editorial coordination at the European level and a strong background in multilingual and digital communication, he specializes in shaping narratives that make higher education more accessible, engaging, and impactful. His work focuses on how communication can foster student success, institutional visibility, and meaningful connections between ULB and its community.
